
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COMMENTARY CORNER: "Paul, Citizenship, Injustice, Protest, and Freedom As a

Child of God" "But Paul said unto them, They have beaten us openly uncondemned, being Romans, and have cast us into prison, and now do they thrust us out privily? Nay, verily; but let them come themselves and fetch us out. And the sergeants told these words unto the magistrates: and they feared when they heard that they were Romans (Acts 16:37-38).



The Sermon on the Mount became an inaugural mass meeting of the disciples of Jesus Christ (Matthew 5:1-8:1). It was during that teaching that we read of how the people of God would distinguish themselves from others. The distinctions were not about the people of God thinking of themselves as better than others, it was instead the people of God learning to live with higher standards of how they treated one another.

We note, for example, a series of comparisons Jesus makes. And we should understand that these are in the contexts of the people of God living under Roman rule and government. The Jews were the people of God and often had to endure mistreatment from those given authority as Roman soldiers, as well as all other Jews.

These soldiers might believe that a fellow lew was behaving disrespectfully, or the solider might be having a bad day, or perhaps he might not like the people in the town where he lived. This might result in a soldier hitting an individual. What was a child of God to do when a sword yielding soldier hit him?

Jesus gives an answer that shocks: "Ye have heard that it hath been said, An eye for an eye, and a tooth for a tooth: But I say unto you, That ye resist not evil: but whosoever shall smite thee on thy right cheek, turn to him the other also" (Matthew 5:38-39). Though these words were written to the Israelites, we

edent for those who would eventually live as his disciples.

There were also words to soldiers who wanted to live in God's favor. John the Baptist advised penitent soldiers, "Do violence to no man, neither accuse any falsely; and be content with your wages" (Luke 3:14).

At the river Iordan, John the Baptist provides teaching to those who understood they needed to repent because the kingdom of God was at hand. On the Mount, Jesus gives teaching to those who would be citizens of the kingdom of God. we should take Paul's next words. He We are blessed to read of an incident that was many years after the lives of John the Baptist and Jesus the Christ on earth.

After many years of preaching the gospel, Paul found himself giving defense for his teaching. During that teaching, the high priest (and Paul did not know he was the high priest) Ananias, commanded that Paul be smitten across the mouth. (Acts 23:2). How did Paul respond to this potential injustice?

Paul addressed the issue from the side of the person who had authority. Luke records, "Then said Paul unto him, God shall smite thee, thou whited wall: for sittest thou to judge me after the law, and commandest me to be smitten contrary to the law" (Acts 23:3).

Whatever Paul thought of the teaching on turning the other cheek, which was also in the law, it did not include him not being able to question another's behavior, even questioning that behavior the standard of the law. There is another profound acknowledgement Paul makes.

understand that Jesus is providing a prec- He calls attention to how God sees mistreatment, what we call in our day, injustice. Paul may not have retaliated by fighting Ananias, but he had something to say.

> In his redress, Paul acknowledges that God can execute vengeance. Paul does not say to Ananias that God sees you. He does not say to him that God does not like you. What Paul says is that God will smite you (Acts 23:3). Paul did not believe that God allows mistreatment or injustice to go unpunished.

> It is difficult to understand just how calls the perpetrator a whited wall, or white washed wall (Acts 23:3). The white washed wall statement would often be used to indicate that someone has covered up something with white that underneath was weak, crumbling, or suggestive of what was good when things were bad. In short, a white washed wall kind of person had an appearance on the outside that hid an ugly person underneath.

> Paul, then, has spoken of the vengeance of God, "God will smite you." He has spoken of the character of a perpetrators, "you whited wall." Paul then sets up a standard for judgment. He says that the priest is commanding what does not measure up to the standard of the written law: "sitteth thou to judge me after the law, and commandest me to be smitten contrary to the law" (Acts 23:3)?

> What we have considered is Paul's responses to religious law. We should understand further that Paul also claimed his rights when it came to civic law.

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

COMMENTARY CORNER

There would be no argument from Paul about whether he was a citizen of the kingdom of God (Colossians 1:13). But Paul was also a Roman citizen.

Like American citizenship, Roman citizenship had it benefits. And one of the benefits was how one would be treated when it came to guilt and innocence. We find Paul engaging this dynamic on more than one occasion.

In Philippi, Paul experienced police brutality on the level of a Rodney King. He was beaten unjustly and then put in prison. When officials discovered that they had done this to a Roman citizen, they tried to cover up their injustice (Acts 16:37). Before then, Paul said, "They have beaten us openly uncondemned, being Romans, and have cast us into prison and now do they thrust us out privily? Nay

verily, but let them come themselves and fetch us out." (Acts 16:37).

Observe how Paul responds to injustice in Philippi. First, he informs the officials of their injustice: "you have beaten us openly uncondemned." In other words, you have executed punishment and we have not even had a trial.

Second, Paul informs these of his citizenship status: "Being Romans." That is, though we are believers, we have rights as citizens. Third, Paul lets them know that he has had two punishments, the beating and prison. Fourth, Paul informs the Philippian officials that they are now trying to hide their misdeed: what they did they did openly, they are now trying to privately sneak Paul out of prison. Fifth, and this is instructive, Paul stages a sitin. He says that he will not come out of prison until the officials meet his demands of fetching Paul out themselves. Paul stayed there until

these men did (Acts 16:39).

Paul would have to again default to his Roman citizenship when the Jews were trying to circumvent Roman law. When some sought to question Paul by beating, Paul asks, "It is lawful for you to scourge a man that is a Roman and uncondemned" (Acts 22:25)? We then read, "When the centurion heard that, he went and told the chief captain saying, Take heed what thou doest: for this man is a Roman" (Acts 22:26).

We should celebrate above everything that we are citizens of the kingdom of God. But this does not mean that we have misrepresented the kingdom of God when we recognize our citizenship, the laws of our country, and justice that is appropriate for all. We are not silenced. And one final thought. Are we willing to be the ones who would say, "Take heed what thou doest, for this man is a United States citizen?"
